□ PAINSWICK ROCOCO GARDEN

Painswick Rococo Garden is the UK's only surviving complete rococo garden and a real hidden gem. Designed in the 1740s as a flamboyant pleasure garden, you'll find fanciful garden buildings and stunning views of the surrounding countryside to while away the hours. www.rococogarden.org.uk GL66TH

☐ BOURTON TO LOWER SLAUGHTER WALK

If long hikes aren't your thing, the Bourton to Lower Slaughter walk should be right up your street at a leisurely 1,3 miles. The walk takes you through beautiful countryside, across fields, alongside the river and into Lower Slaughter before you know it. LECKHAMPTON HILL AND DEVIL'S CHIMNEY

On the outskirts of Cheltenham, Leckhampton Hill offers a gorgeous view of the Cotswolds. It's also home to the intriguing Devil's Chimney, a rock formation that juts out from the hill. ☐ CLEEVE HILL

On a clear day, you can see for miles from Cleeve Hill – it's the highest point on the Cotswold Hills. On the outskirts of Cheltenham, the hill boasts stunning views and is a great place to take those holiday selfies, but don't forget to take your scarf and your woolly jumper to fend off the wind!

□ BROADWAY TOWER

☐ FIVE VALLEYS WALK

The Five Valleys – Chalford Valley, Nailsworth Valley, Ruscombe Valley, Slad Valley (of Cider with Rosie fame) and Painswick Valley – all converge on Stroud, one of the Cotswolds' quirkiest towns. ☐ COALEY PEAK PICNIC SITE


□ GLOUCESTER RUGBY




